






Hogfather (2013)




The House in the Cerulean Sea (2021) By TJ Klune, Recommended by PJ Grayson



Mog's Christmas (2022)



Often, it is while we are in the dark that we grow the most.

Christmas Gifts for the Women's Refuge



Donations can be left at the back of the church.








Winter Quarters From Harper's Young People January 1882

When I moved to Suffolk some 20 years ago, new life, new church, I have a vivid recollection of attending a presentation by the charity Water Aid. It was graphic and memorable, and I was moved to commit giving a monthly gift of £25.

I receive regular mailings from the charity, and when I check my monthly bank statement feel quite comfortable and a bit smug, that I am doing my bit. However, recently, I did a check on inflation figures over the period since I made the commitment, and find that

The British pound has lost 50% of its value since 2002*

The stark reality is that my monthly gift is only buying half the goods and services it did 20 years ago. That gives me no cause for complacency – far from it. I was embarrassed and deflated and have now done something about it!

Carol of the Bells

"Carol of the Bells" is a remix of the Ukrainian song called "Shchedryk"

"Carol of the Bells" is a popular Christmas carol which is based on the Ukrainian song called "Shchedryk" (Ukrainian: Щедрик). The "Carol of the Bells" uses the original melody from "Shchedryk", written by the Ukrainian composer Mykola Leontovych more than 100 years ago - in 1914.

Groups of men and women or children in traditional embroidered dress sing it in Ukraine on the eve of the New Year (by Julian calendar - i.e. on January 13th). The purpose of giving, like carols, is to glorify the master of the house and his family, to wish all the best in a year coming.





The song's journey onto the stage world's and its transformation into an Christmas classic is a tale of musical inspiration, nationalism, and political violence. had been assassinated by the Cheka (the USSR secret police) just over a year before the song's premiere in New York. The premier took place at Carnegie Hall October 5, 1922, for a performance that the New York Tribune dubbed "a marvel of technical skill." Onstage was the Ukrainian National Chorus Alexander conducted by Koshetz.

Now the song is popular all over the world.

Honey Soy Sprouts

Prep: 20 mins Cook: 10 mins

Ingredients

3 tablespoons of honey

2 tablespoons of soy sauce

1 tablespoon of vegetable oil

Ginger to taste

1 garlic clove, sliced

400g shredded or chopped brussels sprouts

1 teaspoon of sesame oil

1 teaspoon of rice wine*



Step 1

Stir the honey and the soy together in a small bowl. Set aside.

Step 2

Heat the oil in a frying pan and fry the ginger and garlic for 1 min. Add the shredded sprouts and stir-fry for 1-2 mins until wilted. Pour in the rice wine, then the honey sauce. Toss everything together.

Season, drizzle with the sesame oil, scatter with sesame seeds and serve.



*Don't have rice wine? You can use dry white wine, stock, dry sherry or apple juice


